Because of the beautiful conditions on Saturday the race committee was able to knock off four well set and competitive races for



the fifteen boats in attendance. This year we had representation from two of our sailmakers who also own Highlanders. Karl Felger of Quantum Sails in Cleveland, Ohio and Bill Fastiggi of Vermont Sails in Winooski, Vermont traveled the long distances to race their Highlanders and support the class at this year's event. Bill was showing off his newly purchased #2006 and definitely continued the winning tradition of that boat.

It was also great to see all the boats being raced with kids and siblings. We had Steve Bauer with his son Jack and Steve's brothers John and Ed; Chris Kafsky with daughter Reid and her friend; Tanner Shultz with his father Kirk (Doc) and Tanner's son Wyatt; Neal Deaves with his son Greg and Bryan Hollingsworth with his daughter Taylor and her significant other Travis. In addition Chris Miros engaged a couple of Clemson Sailing club members to crew and join in the Highlander fun.

My wife Debbie and I sailed with our local friend and hotshot Flying Scot sailor John Kreidler. Now, typically I feign away from having other skippers as crew because of the "too many cooks in the kitchen thing". Mad Plaid

The demise of the Lightning fleet at Cowan Lake lead James Taylor to buy a Highlander two years ago. Although he owned the boat last year he could not sail the 2017 Mad Plaid Regatta because it conflicted with Ohio Districts Lightning Championship. However, he loaned the boat to Bill Fastiggi of Vermont Partner Sails for the regatta. Jim asked me to crew for Bill because years ago I crewed for Jim when we sailed the qualifying regatta to the Mallory Cup which was held in Highlanders at Cowan. Although Bill had never sailed a Highlander until the Friday before the regatta we were fortunate enough to win the 2017 Mad Plaid Regatta. So when Jim called me this year to crew for him I told him that anything less than the first place would be a disappointment, placing Jim under tremendous pressure.

Saturday morning of the 57th Mad Plaid Regatta arrived with little wind and a promise of rising temperatures which threatened to shut off the wind completely before the 16 boats could race. This was a cause for some angst for us since we would be sailing three with Jim, myself,



and Jim's longtime Lightning crew George Auer, while many of the other boats would be sailing with only two. I have been fortunate to have George crew for me in the past when I was campaigning my own Lightning and knew that he would be terrific crew. Fortunately, the wind did not completely shut off and we were able to get in four races in light and shifty winds. The race committee was challenged with constantly having to shift the race courses.

We got off to a good start with a 2nd in the first race despite having to re-round the pin end of the starting line, with long time Cowan Highlander sailor Mark Osterbrock taking the win and Doug

Fisher in 3rd.

In the next race Mark continued his winning ways with another 1st, with Jason Japikse in 2nd, and Steve Bauer was 3rd, while we finished 4th.

In the third race we had an exciting finish with Cowan's Jay Carey, with us taking the win by less than 2 feet, and Japikse in 3rd.

The fourth race started late in the day as the wind became lighter and extremely shifty leading to a first leg of the race being a port tack reach to the weather mark. Although, Jim was able to position us so that we won the pin we were slow coming off the starting line and got rolled by was almost half the fleet. Fortunately, for us the first reach was a run with ever shifting wind, which allowed us to get our chute up quickly while most of the two-man crews went without a spinnaker. Jim did an excellent job

of navigating through the wind shadows to the jibe mark. At the jibe

mark we were able to round 3rd, the 2nd-place boat hit the mark and had to do a penalty turn moving us up to 2nd. However, during the next beat we were passed by two other boats and finished 4th. Meanwhile, Mark Osterbrock sailed to his third win out of four races! Japikse finished in 2nd, and Jay Carey was 3rd. At the end of Saturday Mark Osterbrock had 10 points, Jim

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Taylor had 11 points, and Jason Japikse, last year's runner-up, was in third with 13 points.

Sunday morning arrived with cooler temperatures and to our relief more wind. The first race was won by Jay Carey, Jason Japikse was second, Bruce Busbey was third, with our boat taking a fourth-place, and Mark Osterbrock coming in fifth. This led to a three way tie for first place between Taylor, Japikse, and Osterbrock, with Jay Carey was only four points behind.

We believed that the sixth race was going to be the last race of the regatta. Before the start I commented "bottom of the ninth" and Jim finished the cliché with "all tied up". The three of us exchanged glances knowing that we were all thinking the same thing, which was that between the three of us we have thousands of races under our belts and we'd all been through this before. We were confident in our boat speed, confident in our crew work, and George and I were confident in Jim's ability to get us off the line well. It also didn't hurt that the wind had come up a couple of knots which allowed all three of us to be up on the rail which led to me commenting "it was great to have the band back together again". Once again Jim got an outstanding start and we were able to separate ourselves from the rest of the fleet with the exception of Bruce Busbey. Downwind it was nip and tuck with Bruce. We were able to get through the leeward gate first. From there we walked away from Bruce on the second beat to have a large lead as we headed

downwind for the last time. What I had noticed during the first two legs was that the crew work had really gelled and we were rolling the boat through the tacks well. Jim was dialed into the difficult balance of wind shifts versus velocity, and downwind we were, to quote Dennis Connor, "really hauling the mail". When we finished the race we had a comfortable lead over Bruce Busbey, with 3rd-place Bruce Kitchen (a Flying Scot skipper from Cowan) almost half a leg back. As we sailed downwind watching the fleet sail up to the finish we saw that the momentum pendulum had definitely swung our way with Jay Carey finishing in 4th, Jason in 6th, and Mark in 8th. At the end of six races Jim Taylor had 16 points, Jason Japikse had 21 points, Mark Osterbrock had 24, and Jay Carey was sitting on 25.

The six race turned out not to be the last as the race committee was able to get a 7th race off with only about 10 minutes left before the 11:30 time limit ran out. This left some of the outof-town boats with the difficult decision of whether to sail the last race or pull early because of their long trips home. Since we had a 5 point lead, and our worst finish had been a 4th, we felt confident going into the race. Jim got another great start and we rounded the weather mark first on to the first of two tight reaches of the Olympic course. Our crew work really showed as we are able to handle the set, jibe, and take down with no drama. As happens on tight reaching courses the rich get richer and the poor get poorer, which is

why I have never been a big fan of triangles. The course was skewed to the right eliminating any passing lanes allowing us to sail the last three legs with no threats and finish with our third win of the regatta giving us a final score of 17 points. Jay was 2nd, Mark was 3rd, with Jason Japikse recovered from being pushed over the starting line for 6th.

Amazingly after adding up the points 2nd,

3rd, and 4th place overall all had 27 with Mark Osterbrock winning the count back with three first places for 2nd, Jason Japikse coming in 3rd, and Jay Carey 4th. Bruce Busby finished 5th despite having to count a DNC for the last race because of pulling his boat due to a long drive home.

I want to thank Jim and George for the opportunity to get back out on the water. The Cowan Lake Highlander fleet once again put on an excellent regatta, both on and off the water. The Snipe fleet worked hard shifting the courses to keep up with the wind changes to allow us to get in seven races in just two days. So next year, if you have the means and opportunity, come on out for the 58th Mad Plaid regatta and maybe, just maybe, we can make Jamey Carey's goal of having 20 boats.

Ben has made friends for life and more importantly found something that he really enjoys doing. Sailing at the age of 14 in Indy I was never aware of this great circuit, but I'm so glad that I can provide it to my children now. For that reason I wanted to bring it to your attention as well. If you

have small children or grandchildren that even remotely show an interest in sailing, I would HIGHLY recommend getting more information on what's available in your area. Camps usually allow kids down to ages 5 or 6 and kids can officially start racing Opti Green Fleet at age 7. Don't be intimidated by kids racing at age 7. The Opti fleet offers a great program where brand new sailors can join the green fleet where on the water parent support and coaching is highly encouraged. They can get help at any point on the course and scores aren't taken, but each

sailor gets some sort of award. Green fleet sailors typically start on smaller courses and are in protected break walls to ensure safety. The emphasis is on making sailing fun and getting kids to come back. They're doing a GREAT job with our youth and we should be excited to see this next wave of sailors hit our circuit one day! - Carolina Renaissance Festival, Huntersville is usually on at this time of year


